

Sydney's Eating Landmarks



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People have been coming to Greater Sydney from all over the world for centuries, influencing its culture and cuisine. Here is just a taste of what you can expect to find as you "eat your way around the world" in Greater Sydney.

The Rocks, Circular Quay, Woolloomooloo and Darling Harbour. Pubs, restaurants, cafés, adventurous take-away, fine dining. Sydney's traditional "Chinatown" is in Haymarket not far from Darling Harbour.

Waterfront dining Sydney Fish Markets at Blackwattle Bay, Cronulla, Middle Harbour, Manly, Palm Beach, Bondi Beach, Brighton and La Perouse, Woolloomooloo, Rose Bay and Watsons Bay. Try the sailing, motorboat and rowing clubs and pubs along the harbour's foreshores. Dine afloat on a harbour cruise with lunch, dinner, morning or afternoon tea.

Sydney's Inner suburbs are famous for their pubs, cafés, 24 hour street life and vibrant cosmopolitan lifestyle. Pyrmont, Ultimo, Glebe, Newtown, Enmore, Marrickville, Erskineville, Oxford Street from Darlinghurst to Paddington, Darling Street from the Balmain ferry wharf to Rozelle.

Norton Street, Leichhardt is "Sydney's Little Italy". Italian restaurants, delis and cafés serving some of Sydney's best coffee.

North of the harbour The streets around Kirribilli, Milson's Point, North Sydney, Crows Nest, Mosman, Neutral Bay, Chatswood, Epping, Eastwood and Gladesville are lined with small restaurants, take aways and cafés.

Eating out with CityRail is a great way to experience Greater Sydney's best eateries within easy walking distance of train stations. Experience "Asia" in Cabramatta or Campsie, the exotic Middle East in Lakemba and Auburn and the eat streets of Newtown, Cronulla, Parramatta and North Sydney. Forest Road at Hurstville is lined with Asian restaurants and is very near the station.
